



While we have made significant strides globally, with the UNESCO Institute for Statistics revealing that more than 86% of the world's population is now literate, compared to 68% in 1979, we must acknowledge the challenges that remain. Worldwide, at least 763 million adults still lack basic literacy skills, with two-thirds of them being women, and an alarming 250 million children are unable to acquire fundamental literacy skills.

These figures are not just statistics; they represent real individuals whose potential is hindered by the lack of access to education.

In Sub-Saharan Africa, the situation is particularly dire. The legacy of war, insufficient infrastructure, and recurrent droughts contribute to some of the lowest literacy rates in the world. According to 2022 data from UNICEF, about three-quarters of adults in the region cannot read and write, and one in four children is not attending school. It extends beyond the walls of this institution, into the communities where our knowledge, skills, and values are most needed. UPEACE SIGNING COLLABORATION MOU WITH MOGADISHU UNIVERSITY

We are grateful that we are signing a significant MOU with UPEACE University today.

MoU Signing

25th January was a historic day for higher Education in Somalia as the United Nations University for Peace, popularly known as UPEACE, signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Mogadishu University.

The MOU marks one of the most significant collaborations any University in Somalia has made with an international Institution of higher learning, signalling a move towards improving the standards of local Universities in the country.

UPEACE, with its 40 years of experience in training peacebuilders, and Mogadishu University, the first University to rise from the ashes of Somalia's civil war, had found a common purpose – to nurture a generation of peacemakers in the heart of a nation scarred by violence.

The MOU, which will be implemented in the next five years, outlined a future filled with possibilities, including Joint research projects on conflict resolution, curriculum development focused on peace education, student exchange programs fostering understanding, and academic conferences tapping with the energy of shared knowledge.

This significant MOU was signed a day after UPEACE University hosted a glamorous graduation event where 83 students were awarded master and PhD degrees. The University hosted its third graduation since the UPEACE campus was established in Somalia in 2018. The event was marked with pomp and colour as overjoyed students walked to the stage to receive their awards. Guests who spoke at the graduation narrated how the University has contributed to improving peace in Somalia by educating Somalia's leaders.

Signing the MOU on behalf of UPEACE University, Rector Dr Francisco Roja said, "As the rector and the president of UPEACE University, it is a great honour to sight this memorandum of understanding. This is quite an important step towards the collaboration between the University for Peace and the Somali people represented by Mogadishu University."

On his part, the chairman of Mogadishu University, Dr Ibrahim Mohamed Mursal, noted that the University is grateful for the opportunity to collaborate with UPEACE University.

"We are grateful that we are signing a significant MOU with UPEACE University today. This strongly indicates our commitment to improving our efforts towards peace building through Education. As you know, Mogadishu University was born out of the efforts by scholars and community leaders who wanted to create a better future for the upcoming generation following the collapse of the central government in 1991".

Mogadishu University is one of the oldest universities established in Somalia in recent years following the collapse of the central government more than three decades ago. It was established in 1997, offering thousands of Somali youth an opportunity to pursue higher Education there.

Since the UPEACE Campus was established in Mogadishu five years ago, hundreds of students have graduated from the institution, including Somalia's current President, Dr Hassan Sheikh Mohamud, who graduated with PhD in Peace, Governance and Development.

May 2023 marked another significant milestone for the United Nations University for Peace (UPEACE) in Somalia, following the signing of an agreement between UPEACE and Qatar Charity on sponsoring the first forty PhD Presidential scholarships offered by UPEACE in Somalia.

The scholarship is named after the current sitting president, H.E. Dr Hassan Sheikh Mohamud, and is known as the "H.E. Dr Hassan Sheikh Mohamud Presidential PhD. Scholarship Programme.

While graduating with a PhD in Peace, Governance and Development in December 2022, President Dr Hassan Sheikh Mohamud promised to offer 100 Presidential scholarships to deserving students to increase the number of scholars in the country. Following the promise by the President, Qatar Charity became the first respondent, offering to support the first 40 students who will benefit.

The key objective of the prestigious scholarship is to transform higher education leadership institutions in Somalia by equipping them with doctoral skills, which will enhance local research and academic development.

Speaking at the signing ceremony held in Mogadishu, Somalia's Education Minister Farah Abdikadir said, "We are aiming to improve the quality of Education and research at our higher learning institutions, and that is why we are grateful to QadarCharity for taking the lead in supporting this initiative by our President."

Director of Upeace Africa regional Programs, Prof Samuel Kale Eusi, said, "This is the first step of resolving the challenges facing Somalia. With a good education, Somalia can easily resolve many of these challenges."

The PhD-funded programs will cover four essential areas of study, including a PhD in Peace, Governance, and Development, a PhD in Leadership and Sustainable Development, a PhD in Land Degradation and Desertification and a PhD in Blue Economy, Governance, and Maritime Security.

The scholarship program will be based in Somalia, with multi-campus overseas studies planned to offer a global perspective to the students. UPEACE, a U.N. Mandated University headquartered in Costa Rica, is renowned for its international programs and flagship initiatives across Africa, Asia, China, the European Union, and North, Central, and South America.

This initiative marks a significant step in advancing education and research in Somalia, particularly in peace, governance, development, sustainable leadership, land degradation, desertification, and the blue economy. The scholarship program will undoubtedly contribute to the intellectual and academic growth of the country, fostering a new generation of scholars and leaders committed to Somalia's progress.

The signing of these historical agreements between UPEACE and Qatar Charity showcases the international collaboration and support for Somalia's education sector, paving the way for a brighter future for higher education in the country.

Your Excellency, distinguished guests, the SRSG, The European Union Ambassador, all members of the diplomatic core, lecturers and presidents of universities in Somalia, graduates, parents, friends, ladies and gentlemen. Today, we are here to celebrate education; today, we are here to celebrate a good number of students who have gone through a process, and this process has been midwifed by UPEACE.

I want to start by thanking the University for Peace Rector, DR. Francisco Rojas Aravena, who travelled for about 24 hours from Central America to attend the 3rd graduation ceremony and come to Somalia for the second time. I also want to thank our Ambassador to international organizations in Geneva, Ambassador David Fernandez, for making it to Somalia for the first time.

This is significant because many Somalis had to leave the country for postgraduate studies a couple of years ago. It is notable today that you find other Africans coming to Somalia to graduate. That is testimony to the improvement made in Somalia over the past four years, and UPEACE has been part of that journey.

Today, we celebrate education because Nelson Mandela once said education is the most essential weapon to change the world. From UPEACE, we are using education to transform Somalia, Africa and the world.

A couple of years ago, it could not have been easy to hear that people came to Somalia to study. A couple of years ago, it could have been difficult for people to visit Somalia. The video you just watched reflects an evolving, transforming, and developing society.

In our first class in UPEAC in 2018, I indicated that Somalia might not necessarily need absolute peace because there is no absolute peace. Some may refer to Somalia as the Afghanistan of Africa, but that is untrue.

On several occasions visiting Somalia, some of us ventured into town. We realized people were living everyday lives: children going to school, people doing business, and people just going about their everyday lives. That is not the story that is out of this country. Somalia is such a beautiful place; we have had the opportunity to visit Lido Beach, where we saw people dancing to music in the evenings.

And like I always said, more people die in Chicago every day than the war took place in Somalia, but nobody says there is a war in America; people want to go to America.

Consequently, our holding of the graduation of PEACE programme, where you have students from Cameroon, students from Zambia and, of course, a student graduating with a PhD coming from India, is a testimony to the fact that Somalia is taking a different place today.

We celebrate education because today is the United Nations Education Day, which means we acknowledge education's pivotal role in securing lasting peace. Ali Mazuri said that superiority between individuals depends on who owns what, but superiority between nations depends on who knows what. We are building a very sustainable country and creating a country using education. Someone once said again if you think education is expensive, try ignorance; ignorance and illiteracy are more costly than education. Regarding the expenditure of our education, Somalia benefits from an exceptional status, especially after the signing of the instrument of assertion by President Hassan Sheikh in New York that gives an immediate 30% reduction of fees to Somali students.

As we embark on this new chapter, we must understand that our collective mission, the mission for UPEACE, extends beyond our institutional boundaries, reaching into communities where our knowledge, expertise and values are most needed. In this light, I emphasize the importance of continued collaboration and partnership among all institutions present today. I am happy to acknowledge the presence of the Somali Union of Universities president.

Consequently, in Somalia, the UPEACE Africa Programme has collaborated not only in the continent with the Africa Union in the Great Green World initiative but also provided the first 6,000 trees to support President Hassan Sheikh's programme to Green Somalia. Thank you for your presence, support, and dedication to our shared mission. Thank you to the students for going through our very rigorous programme. Thank you to the friends and family members who have had to endure the absence of their relatives while they were studying.

Thank you for supporting them in their journey's final phase. We have trained you well and will provide the certificates, but that is just the beginning of your academic and professional journey. For those who are graduating with PhD today and who have decided to get into academia, we will expect you to publish, we will expect you to do community service, we will expect you to produce knowledge that informs policy, informs decisions and assists in the development. FOSTERING PEACE THROUGH EDUCATION: COMMEMORATIVE REFLECTION ON INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION DAY

MY EXPERIENCE WITH P.HD AT UPEACE, SOMALIA CAMPUS

My quest for transformative knowledge in Public Policy and socio-economic and constructive political change propelled me to embark on Ph.D. studies at the United Nations University for Peace (UPEACE) in 2019.

Africa is a continent well-endowed with virtually all it needs to transform as one of the key players in the global arena. Unfortunately, this has not been so due to a series of explanations, including the challenge of endemic Corruption in some African Union member states. African Union is a member of the G20; to some, it is an achievement. In contrast, others have contended that having 55 sovereign states occupying a continent with the same economic status as each member of the G20 is an insult. In contrast, the natural resources in Africa are much more than those in the G20. If I am approached regarding why the above ugly reality exists, my response will be "bad governance, including gross Corruption in Africa."

My journey towards postgraduate studies on anti-corruption dates back to 1994, when I competed for and was awarded a British Chevening Scholarship. At that time, the University of Sussex Centre for Corruption Studies had not yet been established, and I decided to embark on a Master of Art in governance and development. I also took an exciting course on Peace and Security under one of the leading global Scholars in this field, Professor Robin Luckham. My MA thesis focused on Corruption and Anti-Corruption in Nigeria's Extractive Sector, emphasising the Nigeria Extractive Industries Transparency Initiatives (NEITI). Dr Mark Robison, the current Executive Director of the global EITI, was my supervisor.

I completed my master's Degree in 2015 and worked with the Centre for Democracy and Development, the USAID and DfID programmes on governance and anti-corruption. These academic qualifications and professional experiences influenced my emergence as the pioneer senior governance Officer for the then African Union Advisory Board on Corruption, now the African Union Advisory Board against Corruption.

I am the Head of Human Rights and Transitional Justice at the African Union Commission, Department of Political Affairs, Peace and Security in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. I was introduced to the PhD programme on Peace, governance and Development at UPEACE by a Senior colleague, Mr David Omozuafor of the UNDP Regional Service Centre for Africa.

I applied for the programme and was successful. We had physical lectures in year one, and the second and third years were devoted to data collection, analysis and writing of the thesis. My experience defending my thesis title, The African Union's Fight against Corruption: Implication for Peace and Development, Case Studies of Nigeria and Rwanda, was exciting and impressive. It helped me to refine the thesis further.

My journey towards the PhD was not easy, but the Almighty god made it happen. Combining a full-time job at the African Union Commission with PhD studies took a lot of work. I no longer had free Saturdays and Sundays pleasures. These were some of the prices I paid—the COVID-19 movement restriction period also helped me as I could do much during the period.

At this juncture, it is also important to emphasise that Professor Khabele Matlosa, then the Director of the Department of Political Affairs at the African Union Commission, encouraged me to publish and focus on my PhD. According to him, I was just a Mr. and nothing more with all my publications. His encouragement was constructive.

Prof Sam Ewusi, my supervisor, was a thorough scholar who could be friendly at a personal level but focused on academic work. His encouragements speak volumes, and I am indeed grateful to him. My darling wife, Esther V. Ikubaje, was always critical of my thesis. She provided quality editorial and content support.

The PhD studies are already influencing public policy interventions and transformation in Africa. I currently advise professional colleagues at the national level, the African Union Advisory Board against Corruption and the African Development Bank to reference but a few on how to successfully combat Corruption in Africa. I also published a book titled African Union and the Fight against Corruption: the Challenges of a Continental Development Architecture. It has been translated into five international languages from its original English version, including French, Spanish, Portuguese and Dutch. I am grateful to know how little one impacts Peace, governance and development in Africa.

In conclusion, my professional environment provided me with first-class practical knowledge and experience(s) working with national anti-corruption commissions in Africa. My experience working with CSOs on anti-corruption in Africa speaks volumes and positively influenced my PhD studies. In all, the Almighty god made the Ph.D. happen as planned.

Tell us more about yourself

My name is Namondo Mbonji Mbonde Epse Soltys. I am a Cameroonian citizen and currently work with the revenue collection department under the Ministry of Finance as a full-time employee in Cameroon.

How did you learn about UPEACE University?

I have a cousin who attended UPEACE in Costa Rica between 2015 and 2016, and he told me about it; then, we got to Professor Kale, who explained everything to me. Professor Kale then advised me to attend the African programme, which is closer to home, because I am working full-time. He clarified that it was going to be easier for me. I did not choose the country, I did not choose my classmates, and I just applied for the UPEACE African programme and ended up joining the Somalia Campus.

What are the advantages of attending UPEACE?

The most significant advantage to mention is that the course is done on an online platform. This helps a lot since the lectures are recorded, and the students can replay and re-listen after the lectures.

It aids in filling in the gaps and allowing the students to follow up in case they missed something during the lectures. The other advantage is that, as students, we have developed very active student groups where we study in groups. We share notes and sometimes share experiences, especially during group assignments. All these advantages have helped me cope with my studies while simultaneously being a full-time employee in Cameroon.

How was your first visit to Mogadishu during your recent graduation?

I went to Mogadishu, and it was my first time. It was an excellent physical meeting with my classmates; they were pleased to see me, and generally, everything went well. I was fearless of travelling to Mogadishu despite all the security concerns. Since earning my first degree, I have always wanted to explore and travel to different places, so going to Mogadishu for my graduation was an opportunity. Besides, I was eager to meet my classmates. While in Mogadishu, UPEACE senior managers guided me throughout.

They told me not to move around and that I should always tell them whenever I left my hotel room. They also informed me to wear my Hijab whenever I was going to the hotel.

What next for you? Will you continue with a Ph.D., and will that be from UPEACE?

I want to continue with my Education. I would love to enrol for PhD this year at the Somalia campus. I don't regret doing my master's in Somalia. My master's was in Peace, Governance and Development. My course is not directly related to my job right now, but I want to do more on Governance in the future.

I look forward to changing my career to get into a position that will allow me to practice Governance. I have already worked in the finance department for twelve years, and I would like to be active in the field. I also plan to apply for international jobs once I finish my PhD.

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


MA in Disaster Resilience, Leadership and Humanitarian Action (MA-DRLHA)

The Master of Arts (MA) degree in Disaster Resilience, Leadership and Humanitarian Action (DRLHA) emphasizes the development of a generation of disaster resilience leaders (DRL) as well as strengthen the capacity of existing leaders in the field of DRM. The program specifically strengthens leadership and resilience competencies to increase their effectiveness and involvement in disaster risk reduction and management and humanitarian assistance. The programme is designed as a modular programme involving thirteen (13) taught modules and a field practicum plus a dissertation. The program is designed to cover holistic domains including conceptual fundamentals of disaster resilience, resilience programming and learning, measurement and analytics, monitoring and evaluation in DRM, leadership and climate change, environment and health and nutrition in emergencies. The Master programme is designed to target individuals with an interest in addressing issues of disaster risk through a community development focus. It is ideally suited for persons with a basic degree and who are into their early to mid-careers.

Programme Objectives and Deliverables

- i. The MA programme is designed to meet the needs of scholars and students interested in peace and conflict studies with a distinct focus on Africa. To arrive at the afore-mentioned goal, the educational purposes and objectives of the MA programme include:
- ii. To systematically strengthen the capacity of existing Emergency Response (ER) and Disaster Risk Management (DRM) students and sector leaders at multiple levels
- iii. To systematically strengthen the capacity of ER and DRM in academic, government and development and humanitarian organizations
- iv. To support the development of future leaders by institutionalizing disaster resilience leadership in higher education programs
- v. To expand and strengthen a network of public, private, and NGO stakeholders by globally linking a community of practice of disaster resilient leaders.

Master of Arts, Energy, Economics and Governance (EEG)

Introduction

The world's long-term economic development depends on the existence of efficient, innovative and creative energy and resources industries. These in turn rely on individuals who possess a sound grasp of their legal, economic, governance, technical and policy backgrounds. However, and unique to Somalia, low energy uptake and lack of access to a variety of energy sources including hydro-power; low level of access to modern energy; inadequate infrastructure for generation, transmission and distribution; low level of energy efficiency; high tariffs; the unreliable and inefficient energy supply; inadequate Institutional and regulatory capacity continue to adversely impact on the country's energy sector.

The Master of Energy Economics and Governance Programme is intended to develop a pool of specialists with energy-sector specific skills; and equip future leaders, policy planners and managers in energy-related businesses and institutions, both in public and private sector. In the current dynamic and highly globalized energy markets, the Program aims at producing competency and professionals for managerial, advisory, and academic positions in the energy sector. It aims at giving a deep understanding of the complexity of the current energy transformations in Africa and the World at large. The Program offers a unique, multidisciplinary approach which distinguishes it from other master's programmes in the field of energy studies. It analyses the links between the different levels of energy governance, from an international to a local level, offering problem - focused learning at the crossroads of theory and practice. In this regard, pertinent issues include optimal extraction of energy resources, upstream and downstream energy value chain, local and international/global energy market dynamics, modelling energy production, supply and demand and regulatory policies.

Programme Objectives

UPEACE Africa Programme's mandate to strengthen capacities in peace, conflict and development related areas couldn't be more relevant to address the growing and recurrent international relations and human rights protection. Since 2004, UPEACE Africa Programme has achieved some milestones within this mandate; however, an urgent need exists to improve the skills, knowledge and capacity of policy makers and legislators to link research to policy on complex issues of international relations and development. Africa still lacks a critical mass of peace and development researchers to engage in the academic, policy and practice issues affecting the resilience and sustainable development of the continent. Also, very few institutions or programmes exist with specific focus on African International Law and Human Rights.

On the continent, some courses in International Law and Human Rights are taught within Development Studies and Development Economics, while International Law and Human Rights postgraduate programmes are still a novelty, offered in a few universities in Africa. Courses designed to meet International Law and Human Rights are rarer in Africa. With the above juxtaposed 'needs-versus-ability' scenario, UPEACE with its vast connection and presence in the global development agenda led by the UN, the Africa Programme's mandate couldn't be more relevant. Deriving policy implications from research requires the development of innovative training programmes to strengthen capacities for analysis and development policy implementation.

It is also important to note that the Master of Arts in International Law and Human Rights programme fits well in Sustainable Development Goal 16 on Peace, justice and strong institutions. The aim of the goal is to significantly reduce all forms of violence, and work with governments and communities to end conflict and insecurity through promoting the rule of law at the national and international levels and ensure equal access to justice for all. In addition, the MA in International Law and Human Rights in line with goal 11 of African Union Agenda 2063 that focuses on entrenching democratic values, practices, universal principles of human rights, justice and the rule of law.

UPEACE Africa Programme's mandate to strengthen capacities in peace, conflict and development related areas couldn't be more relevant to address the growing and recurrent climatic and human-induced disasters. Since 2004, UPEACE Africa Programme has achieved some milestones within this mandate; however, an urgent need exists to improve the skills, knowledge and capacity of policy makers and legislators to link research to policy on complex issues of Water Resources Management and Climate Change Adaptation development. Africa still lacks a critical mass of water resource management researchers to engage in the academic, policy and practice issues affecting the resilience and sustainable development of the continent. Also, very few institutions or programmes exist with specific focus on African water resource management and climate change resilience.

The above objectives presume measurable deliverables including among others:

3. Advanced written essays as final course papers for each of the modules, including policy briefs, project proposals and critical essays
4. A well written final dissertation based on empirical research or thematic analysis of a problem





Programme Structure and Timeline

The programmes will offer 12 courses over 12 months, totaling 36 academic credits. A final 15000-word research paper (Dissertation) worth 8 credits will be mandatory for the award of Master of Arts. The total duration of the MA program is 18 months including the research work. Each student will be expected to attend a 3-week long face-to-face or online courses and take comprehensive exams on each of the courses. The course will be completed with a final dissertation which will be presented during the period of residency and graduation.

Given the various professional commitments of students, the

MA programme can be completed via two routes:

- a. **Full time online-only (FO): This corresponds to completion of all required credits and a Dissertation within 18 months from the date of registration;**
- b. **Full time face to face: Completion of all required credits and a Dissertation in 18 months.**

Admission to the MA will be open throughout the year, and enrolled students can begin in January or September.

From a practical perspective, the programs provide a sophisticated and solid theoretical background in each module. The central idea is to apply a theoretical and practical framework to the way participants think and work the various fields. The programme is structured in 13 Modules including an independent research project or optional field visits/internship.

UPEACE embraces an innovative and interdisciplinary approach to both the pedagogy and content. Our academic programs offer specialized, multidisciplinary courses and our international faculty uses engaging and participatory teaching models for face to face classroom instruction.

Teaching and Assessment Methodology

A strong grounding in proactive, student-centered learning is the envisioned pedagogical philosophy of the MA programme. To ensure that all students get the full benefits as face to-face learning, interactive, participatory, task-based methodology will be fostered, to enable critical reflection while leaving room for creativity and validation of multiple points of views.

The proposed MA programmes will primarily use a variety of learning methods for teaching. Students will have face-to-face or online teaching sessions 3 days a week (Thursday, Friday and Saturday) throughout the year. All materials will be composed of scientifically sourced and originally-authored work by in-house and external academic contributors. For all modules, students will be supported by faculty and tutors (facilitators) who will provide course materials and feedback on their work and will be available to them by face to face, email and online

sessions.

Learning will generally be self-directed, applied and collaborative. However, several aspects of the learning process will be assessed to contribute to students' final grades, including – substantive participation in discussions, individual and group written assignments, applied (creative) project development and presentation. All grades will reflect the UPEACE established grading system.

The MA programmes will be taught in English. Applicants from Arabic speaking countries will therefore be encouraged to have an intermediate or higher level of English to partake in English language discussions. All discussions will be conducted in English. Students will be offered all course guides and syllabi in English.

Admission Requirements and Process

For eligibility and admission into the MA programmes, the following criteria will apply:

Education: A 3 or 4-year Bachelor degree in Social or Behavioral Science, Business, Economics and Humanities

Skills: A functional knowledge and familiarity with e-learning tools – internet search engines, Microsoft Word and Powerpoint, (internet access is implied)

Language ability: Proof of **advance** ability in English is mandatory. For the primary language, this implies either having completed undergraduate study in English or attended tertiary education in any native-speaking English country. Arabic speakers must demonstrate intermediate level English competence through a phone or face to face interviews. Speakers of other languages must demonstrate ability in English through an established professional language exams

To apply, candidates will submit their applications online using the link provided below. The applicant is required to submit:

- A Completed Application form
- Bachelor Degree University Certificates and Transcripts (certified)
- A 1000-word Statement of Purpose
- Proof of English language competence

- To waive the English language proficiency test report requirements, applicants from non-English speaking countries may present one of the following documents:
 - Undergraduate or previous master's degree from an English speaking university (language of instruction must be clearly stated on transcript)
 - Letter from a higher-education institution certifying enrolment in or completion of an undergraduate or master's programme where the medium of instruction was English
- An updated Curriculum Vitae (CV)
- Two recommendation letters (ideally sent electronically or if in hard copy, must be signed, sealed and dated, with valid contact information. Valid referees include former/current professors, and employers)
- Passport size photographs
- Copy of passport

Once successful candidates are selected, Admission Letters will be sent to them detailing the financial terms available for them. They must confirm such terms in signature and pay the non-refundable enrolment fee to confirm their place in the programme. Once payment is made, they will be issued a UPEACE student ID and access to the 'Classrooms'.

Doctor of Philosophy in Peace, Governance and Development (PGD)

Introduction

The University for Peace (UPEACE) has established itself as a leading Institution in building capacity for peace in Africa, through its Africa Regional Institute based in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. Over the last 15 years UPEACE has organized short courses, developed MA Program with partner universities across the continent and has supported doctoral research through awards and fellowships to African Ph.D. students registered with Universities in Sub-Saharan Africa and specializing in the areas of peace, conflict, governance, security, and development.

Close to a thousand academicians, researchers, policymakers, and members of civil society organizations from 36 countries across the continent have benefited from these various undertakings.

From its inception, the Africa Regional Office of UPEACE has adopted a "collaborative approach" to working with existing universities on the continent. In its drive to produce high-level African researchers on peace and conflict issues, UPEACE collaborated with IDRC to provide research grants to 56 Ph.D. candidates registered for their Ph.D. in 19 Universities in Sub-Saharan Africa.

The Africa Regional Programme has also endeavored to provide a vehicle for the promotion of African researchers and those working on issues of Africa through the establishment of the Africa Peace and Conflict Journal (APCJ), a peer-reviewed journal that comes out twice a year and UPEACE Africa Policy Series published once a year.

The PhD in Peace, Governance and Development offers a unique opportunity for students to have an interdisciplinary examination of governance, power, authority, conflict, peace, and development in the global and African contexts. The program interrogates the concepts, tools, and assumptions that have served scholars and practitioners in the past and assesses new approaches for addressing contemporary and future challenges. Graduate students in the program will examine the variety of actors, institutions, ideas, rules, and processes that contribute to governance, development, and security management. In addition, international organizations and inter-state relations, the study of African governance examines the plethora of non-state actors as well as rules, norms, and institutions. This will prepare them to take on advanced careers in peace, governance, and development with the ability to advance governance, peace and development theory and practice, and enhance the contributions that public policy analysis can make to the larger community.

The program fits in Sustainable Development Goal 16 which targets 'Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions'. SDG 16 focuses on the promotion of peaceful societies, the provision of justice for all, and the building of effective and accountable institutions at all levels.



Doctor of Philosophy in Blue Economy and Maritime Security (BEMS)

Introduction

The Ph.D. in Blue Economy and Maritime Security (BEMS) is an innovative and specialized program designed to equip students with an in-depth understanding of the multidisciplinary dimensions of the global Blue Economy and the crucial role of Maritime Security. This program targets professionals, researchers, and policy-makers who aim to understand, design, and implement strategies for sustainable development, governance, and security of the Waterbodies resources.

The programme entails mandatory coursework and an extensive research project. The programme is targeted towards middle and high-level academics and practitioners seeking to consolidate their knowledge in the field of Blue Economy and Maritime Security. The Programme is administered by the UPEACE Uganda office but supervised by UPEACE headquarters in Costa Rica which will issue the Degrees.

Program Objectives

The primary focus of the programme is on teaching and researching in the field of Blue Economy and Maritime Security. It is expected that the program will develop an atmosphere where faculty are accessible to students. Teaching and research will be complimentary with each other, and the program will encourage faculty and students to jointly publish cutting edge research materials. The PhD in Blue Economy and Maritime Security aims to achieve the following specific objectives:

- To provide advanced knowledge and skills in the areas of Blue Economy and Maritime Security.
- To foster research and innovation in sustainable use and governance of maritime resources.
- To create an understanding of global maritime security issues and their implications for the Blue Economy.
- To nurture a culture of evidence-based decision-making and policy formulation in the Blue Economy and Maritime Security sectors.

Doctor of Philosophy in Combating Land Degradation and Desertification (CLDD)

Introduction

The University for Peace (UPEACE) has established a PhD in Combating Land Degradation and Desertification in a bid to address one of the world's challenges that is endangering human existence. This will prepare them to take on advanced careers in land management and enhance the contributions that the knowledge obtained can make to the larger community. The program fits in Sustainable Development Goal 15 on life on land targets to combat desertification, restore degraded land and soil, including land affected by desertification, drought and floods, and strive to achieve a land degradation-neutral world by 2030. The PhD in land degradation and desertification also fits Sustainable Development Goal 13 on climate action, which targets Improving education, awareness-raising, human, and institutional capacity on climate change mitigation, adaptation, impact reduction and early warning. The programme also fits well in SDG 2 on zero hunger, which targets ensuring sustainable food production systems and implement resilient agricultural practices that increase productivity and production.

Programme Objectives

The primary focus of the programme is on teaching and researching issues concerning Combating Land Degradation and Desertification. The overall objective is to promote students' abilities in dealing with land degradation and desertification issues.

Introduction




